Alexander Kennedy Isbister Award For Non-Fiction / Prix Alexander-Kennedy-Isbister pour les études et essais

Neil Besner taught Canadian literature at the University of Winnipeg for 30 years (1987-2017), retiring as Provost and Vice President, Academic. He has published many articles, book chapters, and reviews, as well as books on Mavis Gallant and Alice Munro, and has co-edited collections of poetry and short fiction. He is also a published translator from Portuguese to English. His most recent book is *Fishing With Tardelli: A Memoir of Family in Time Lost* (2022).

She is an award-winning poet and the celebrated author of five children's picture books as well as two novels, *Rue des Rosiers* (2019) and *The Knife Sharpener's Bell* (2009). She lives and writes in Vancouver, where she is Associate Professor Emerita at the School of Creative Writing at UBC. She is currently completing her eighth collection of poetry.

Oyíndàmólá Áláká is a Nigerian-born award-winning community organizer, project manager and creative strategist. She holds a B.A (Adv.) in Women and Gender Studies from the University of Manitoba. She is the recipient of the Manitoba Human Rights Commission - Sybil Shack Youth Award (2019), the Black History Month Manitoba Youth Achievement Award (2020), Nigerian Professionals in Manitoba Top 10 Nigerian Professionals. She is also a sought-after political campaign strategist and has worked on historical campaigns both at the municipal and provincial levels of the Manitoban government. In 2020, Oyíndàmólá co-founded NOIR Professionals, a start-up with the goal of connecting, creating, and cultivating opportunities for Black professionals in Canada. Currently, she is the general manager at Manitobans for the Arts.

Sonja Boon is an award-winning researcher, writer, teacher, and flutist. Professor of Gender Studies at Memorial University, she is the author of the memoir *What the Oceans Remember: Searching for Belonging and Home* (WLU Press, 2019), and has published in ROOM magazine, The Ethnic Aisle, Riddle Fence, and Geist. For six years, Sonja was principal flutist with the Portland Baroque Orchestra. She has also appeared with the Toronto Symphony, Hallé Orchestra, and Holland Festival of Early Music.

Kevin Spenst (he/him) is the author of three poetry collections with Anvil Press and over a dozen chapbooks with three more just out with Collusion Books, the Alfred Gustav Press, and 845 Press. Manitowapow Award / Prix Manitowapow

Charlene Van Buekenhout is a Red River Metis and Belgian Canadian theatre artist working and living with her family on Treaty 1 land. Her artistic career can be seen throughout the past 20 years of the professional and independent theatre landscape in Winnipeg. She spent 6 years as the programming and marketing director at Dalnavert Museum and is now a freelance arts leader, administrator, creator, performer, director, and experimentalist. Her recent creation and performance work in theatre has been to revitalize, use, and create awareness for the endangered Southern Michif language.

D.A. Lockhart is the author of multiple collections of poetry and short fiction. His work has been shortlisted for the Raymond Souster Award, Indiana Author's Awards, First Nations Communities READ Award, and has been a finalist for the ReLit Award. He is pùkuwànkoamimëns of the Moravian of the Thames First Nation. Lockhart currently resides at Waawiiyaatanong and Pelee Island where he is the publisher at Urban Farmhouse Press.

Darrel J McLeod is Nehiyaw (Cree) from Northern Canada, Treaty 8. He has been a French immersion teacher, School Principal in Yekooche First Nation, Director of a curriculum center, Executive Director of Education and International Affairs at the Assembly of First Nations, and Chief Negotiator for the Government of Canada. Darrel is fluent is French, Spanish as well as English, and is studying Cree. Darrel's memoirs, *Mamaskatch, A Cree Coming of Age* and its sequel, *Peyakow: Reclaiming Cree Dignity* were published by Douglas and McIntyre in 2018 and 2021, respectively. *Mamaskatch* won the Governor Genera's Award for non-fiction, was shortlisted several other prestigious awards, and has been published in French and German. *Peyakow* was shortlisted for the Writers' Trust non-fiction prize in 2021, as well as being shortlisted for two B.C. book prizes, the Hubert Evans Non-Fiction Prize, and the Jim Deva Prize for Writing that Provokes. Darrel is busy putting the final touches in his first novel, *A Season in Chezgh'un* and writing his fourth book, *The Days After and the Days Before*. McNally Robinson Book for Young People Award

Kevin Sylvester is an author and illustrator of more than 30 books for children. His latest is *Apartment 713*. He has been nominated for the GGs, Lambdas, MYRCAs, Silver Birch (Ontario) and more.

Cary Fagan's books for children have won the Marilyn Baillie Picture Book Award, the IODE Jean Throop Book Award, a Mr. Christie Silver Medal, and the Joan Betty Stuchner--Oy Vey! --Funniest Children's Book Award. For his body of work, he has received the Vicky Metcalf Award for Literature for Young People. He also writes books for adults. His work has been translated into twelve languages.

Lindsay Wong is the author of the critically acclaimed, award-winning, and bestselling memoir *The Woo-Woo*, which was a finalist for Canada Reads 2019. She has written a YA novel entitled *My Summer of Love and Misfortune*. Her debut short story collection *Tell Me Pleasant Things About Immortality* was released in February 2023. Wong holds a BFA in creative writing from the University of British Columbia and an MFA in literary nonfiction from Columbia University. She currently teaches creative writing at the University of Winnipeg.

McNally Robinson Book of the Year

Kate Caley has published two short story collections and three collections of poetry, and her plays have been performed in Canada, the US and the UK. She has won the Trillium Book Award, an O. Henry Prize, and the Mitchell Prize for Poetry, and been a finalist for the Governor General's Award for Fiction. Her writing has appeared in *Best Canadian Poetry* and *Best Canadian Stories*. She lives in Toronto with her wife and their children.

Per Brask has published three books of poetry. He has also published six volumes of Danish poetry, co-translated with Patrick Friesen, one of which was shortlisted for the Griffin Poetry Prize in 2016. He has contributed essays, poetry, stories, and translations to literary and academic journals. He has also edited books. He taught in The U of W's Department of Theatre and Film from 1982-2018.
